## WELCOMING A FAMILY SEEKING REFUGE

In response to Our Holy Father's exhortation to all Catholic parishes to sponsor a refugee family, Our Lady Immaculate parish joined with Holy Rosary parish in December of 2015 to begin the process of sponsoring a family. The Diocesan Office for Refugees will be presenting us with the profile of a family that matches our request. Once we have selected a family to sponsor, it may only be a matter of weeks before their arrival. Our family may come from any of a number of countries.

Our responsibilities began in January with preparation for the family's arrival and extend for their first year in our community. We have formed a number of sub-committees that are attending to the various tasks of orientation and settlement. I am the chair of the Settlement/Orientation/ Transportation committee. We are actively preparing a 'Welcome Binder' for the family. In addition, members have been busy with police checks and driver screening. We have been greatly assisted by a number of different local organizations that work with refugees.



We are most appreciative of the financial support provided by the parish through the envelope collection, and through the Knights of Columbus and the Catholic Women's League. Together with Holy Rosary Parish, we have raised over \$63,000.00 to cover the costs of the first year for the family. We have just been informed that since our family will most likely be a non-Syrian family, their air transport costs will not be covered by the government. We continue to make the government aware of the need to treat all refugees the same, no matter their country of origin.

We still have a couple of fundraising activities planned. There will be a Dinner/Dance on April 30th at the Victoria East Golf and Country Club. Tickets will be available at the weekend masses of April 9/10 and April 16/17 at a cost of \$100.00 each. The Knights of Columbus are sponsoring a garage sale on May 15th. She tries some creative coping strategies at school and realizes there are lots of things she just doesn't need to worry about. This book gives great strategies kids can actually use. There is also a great Note to Parents and Educators at the back of the book which gives wonderful tips for "dealing with an anxious child."

We don't give thanks because we're happy. We are happy because we give thanks! This beautifully illustrated book takes the reader on an illuminating journey through nature, stopping often to marvel and appreciate simple and lovely things along the way. The story exposes still other things we take for granted, like the golden rays of the sun, a pet dog, and shade on a hot day. Sometimes you have to be quiet and still for a moment or you might not hear the secret when a bird sings, or when a family member tells you a story around the dinner table. This book teaches us to really respect and embrace the world around us. It would make a fantastic gift for First Communion or to welcome a new baby. It is a wonderful way to start a discussion in your family about gratitude.

On March 5, Sister Margaret Kane presented to parishioners on "The Gift and Invitation of Mercy". This event was organized by the Volunteer Co-ordinator Committee in keeping with the Holy Father's designation that this be a "Holy Year of Mercy".

Sister Margaret used a modern day parable to help people look at the good in each person and to identify the underlying roots of mercy. She said that God bestows mercy towards self and towards others when we ask for it. Jesus is God's mercy made flesh and we must ask ourselves, "What was the heart and attitude of Jesus?". She also spoke of the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy from the Gospel (Matthew 25) and guided the group to look at the different ways that people are fulfilling the works of mercy in today's world.

As one participant noted, "Mercy is the expanding of the human heart and lack of mercy is the shriveling of the human heart." Sister Margaret ended her presentation with the closing prayer by Archbishop Oscar Romero titled: Creating the Church of Tomorrow."
