The young James McSharry was asked in 1983 by then-Bishop Paul Reding to consider studying to become a priest for the Diocese of Hamilton. Fr. McSharry was ordained in 1992, having lived in Canada since 1985. Since his ordination, Fr. McSharry has served in many parishes throughout Hamilton Diocese, coming to us from his most recent posting in Owen Sound.

A Presentation by Dr. Josie Lombardi on our Blessed Mother, Mary

On Monday, May 9, 2016, the Volunteer Coordinator Committee hosted a seminar for parishioners on our Blessed Mother, Mary. Dr. Josie Lombardi, of St. Augustine's Seminary, gave an insightful and reflective presentation on our Blessed

Mother with scriptural references. Dr. Lombardi guided her audience through the familiar mysteries of the rosary as they pertained to Mary's life and connected them to our own human experience of life and in particular our sorrows and our struggles. She stated that Mary had a heroic trust for God's will by her saying, "Yes" to the angel Gabriel and asked the question, "Can we say yes to God's plan for us?" and went on to say that, "God is the God of the impossible" as proven in the Messiah's conception and in the conception of the Herald of the Messiah, St. John the Baptist. God set Mary apart for this special mission. She spoke of our relationship with God stating that God's delays in answering our requests are not necessarily denials and what God desires is our fulfillment and our resto-

ration. God holds up the lowly and humbles the proud. Highlights of the presentation:

- Mary can relate to people who have been humiliated with great shame by their secret crosses and knows what it feels like to be exposed and shamed
- Jesus' pain in the crucifixion was public and so was Mary's •
- God works through sacred friendships. Fear, pride and jealousy can keep us from loving perfectly
- Sacred friendships involve a "knowing" just as a parent knows their child. Knowing when to call, when to help, when to • answer and when to remain silent
- Mary experienced Seasons of Plenty: an abundance of spiritual and material gifts and Seasons of Drought: Struggling in life and feeling judged and condemned.
- Only God can fill our voids. God is our first love. Everything else is secondary
- Mary knows what it is like to live with bad news as when the prophet Simeon reveals to Mary, "And a sword will pierce your . own heart" at the presentation at the temple.
- Mary can relate to today's refugees and migrants as she experienced change and struggle when the Holy Family became . refugees in the flight into Egypt
- Mary relates to us when we worry about our children as seen in the story of finding Jesus in the temple .
- Pope John Paul II, referred to Mary as the feminine genius when she prompted Jesus to begin His ministry at the wedding at Cana
- During Jesus' three years of public ministry, Mary suffered with her Son through slander, and like all parents, carrying crosses with our children, seeing their children suffer and knows the pain of watching a child die. Mary's pain is vindicated with the resurrection
- At the end of Mary's life she was assumed to Heaven in body, mind and spirit and God summoned the apostles to her at the end of her life to be with her to comfort and console our Blessed Mother
- Mary is one with us. She intercedes for us and she knows our joys and our sorrows because she experienced them in the . seasons of life

The presentation gave the audience a tangible way to pray through Mary by relating her experiences with ours in terms of human suffering.
